January President's Message

Friends,

Were this an ordinary month, I'd be using this column to tell you about our Chanukah Party [it was great!], thanking all the many people who helped [Thank You! Thank You!], and about the very nice turnout we had [over 40 people!]. But for me this past month has been no ordinary month. It was the month we had to put our 14 year old dog to sleep.

In popular culture the dog is "man's best friend." But in Jewish culture, dogs have usually not been regarded with such enthusiasm. In the Torah the dog is viewed as an unclean animal, a savage scavenger. One cannot use money obtained from selling a dog to buy an animal for sacrifice in the Temple. Dogs do not fare much better in the Talmud. "A person should not raise a dog unless it is chained down." Rabbi Eliezer the Great says, "He who breeds dogs is like a person who breeds swine . . . those who breed dogs are cursed." In the Zohar, the main text of Jewish mysticism, dogs are symbols of the demonic, and evil in the world is described as being like a vicious dog on a long leash. Moving on to later day Yiddish culture, dogs were often viewed as the unfriendly agents of gentile landowners and other oppressors. Sholem Aleichem wrote, "If a Jew has a dog, either the dog is no dog, or the Jew is no Jew." A particularly offensive Yiddish insult is "du bist a hunt mit di oyern (you are a dog with ears)."

Yet all is not negative about dogs. In Exodus one finds the law that one should give treif meat torn by beasts in the field to dogs; later midrash interpreted this as a reward for the dogs not barking at the Israelites when they departed from Egypt. Of the 12 spies that Moses sent to Canaan, only Caleb and Joshua argued that the people should trust G-d and go in to possess the land. The name Caleb in Hebrew is spelt with the same letters as the word for dog – kelev – and is often translated as meaning "faithful, whole hearted" (kaf+lamed = "all", lamed+vav = "heart"); what description could be more appropriate for a dog? In the Talmud it says, "Dwell not in a town where no barking of dogs is heard," for barking dogs is a sign that the town is well guarded (I wish our neighbor had this attitude).

More generally Jewish thought teaches that one must be kind to animals, for one who can be cruel to an animal will wind up being cruel to people. I believe that, not only do we cultivate kindness by treating animals well, we may even learn kindness and other positive traits from such interactions. As I remember my dog, the thing that comes most to mind is that all our dog wanted to do was to be with us: in the living room, in the dining room, in the bed, in the bathroom – just not in the car, which usually meant a trip to the vet. I recall many evenings with my wife and dog in the bedroom watching TV, and me at the dining room table working, only to look up and see my dog waiting by me. What did he want? To go outside? No. Something to eat? No. What he wanted was for me to stop working, go into the bedroom, and get



into bed with everyone else. A more loyal, happy, constant friend I have not known. Jewish tradition frowns upon mourning the loss of a pet with the same rituals reserved for humans. No kaddish. So I will end simply with, Goodnight sweet Max, and flights of angels sing thee to thy rest.
