

### August's President's Message

Friends,

We are in the midst of the "dog days of summer" otherwise known as the "summer doldrums." The latter reference to doldrums refers to an area in the oceans close to the equator called the intertropical convergence zone. That's where tall sailing ships often encountered calm winds that left the ships stalled and unable to progress on their journey. The "dog days of summer" is actually a misnomer. The "dog days" refer to Sirius, the brightest star in the constellation Canis Major, which means "big dog" in Latin and is supposed to represent one of Orion's hunting dogs.

To the Greeks and Romans, the "dog days" occurred around the time Sirius appeared to rise alongside the sun, in late July in the Northern Hemisphere. They believed the heat from the two stars combined to make these days the hottest of the year, a period that could bring fever or even natural or manmade catastrophe.

In ancient times the summer was also when disease and plagues would more frequently afflict whole communities, though the causes are well understood today. The current COVID-19 pandemic is not so much related to the seasons; however one cannot avoid a sense that the doldrums have taken hold of many of us in dealing with the pandemic, including those responsible in local and national government. Too many are reluctant to deal with new data – facts – as they emerge.

And the facts are inescapable. The Delta variant is spreading rapidly, and the roughly 50% of the U.S. population that, at this writing, is not fully vaccinated is at risk. Further, even those who are fully vaccinated have some risk, albeit small, of being infected; thus far it has been found that vaccinated people who get infected do not become seriously ill, but new data may change that conclusion. My concern is the variants to come, i.e. epsilon, zeta, eta ... You get the idea. Each of us is a petri dish for new mutations, unless we get to herd immunity when more than 70% of people are fully vaccinated.

It now appears that medical authorities are moving toward a recommendation that we all return to wearing masks when indoors or in large crowds. There is some inconsistent, confusing and ever changing support for that position among our political leaders. Some of our members have been urging us to relax our COVID restrictions during services. My sense is that we should continue with masks, social distancing, abbreviated services and limiting contact during the Torah service.

It is frustrating to acknowledge that progress with COVID is not relentlessly positive. There will be periods when we may need to pause or even reverse relaxing restrictions.

Whatever the Greeks and Romans may have thought caused catastrophes during the summer, it was during such a time that the Temple was twice destroyed in Jerusalem. Now, following the Haftorahs of Rebuke which led up to Tisha B'Av, we are now reading the Haftorahs of Consolation and preparing for the High Holidays. We will have a Selichot service at BHBI on Sunday morning, August 29, at 9 AM. Selichot are penitential prayers at the end of Elul in preparation for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

# Do not send it to any temple office. <u>All listings must be prepaid</u>. Listings not prepaid by press time will not be published.


